11) The NY Democratic County Committee bylaws were modified to exempt candidates from an expensive primary process. It is basically a caucus where unlike other Boroughs proxies are not allowed. County committee members represent the democratic voters in their election district. The waited vote is based upon the number on votes on the democratic line for Governor, normally a high turn out election. A large majority of voters in our district have strong democratic leanings. A primary usually makes voters aware of who is the democratic candidate. In order to expedite and save money in a special election a caucus system is used. The two major parties as we know have great policy differences, I believe voters are entitled to know the difference. I was selected by the 186 elected members of the 65 AD county committee I don't believe that non partisan elections allow the voters to decide who would best represent our district. The council election in the Bronx was dictated by party bosses and Albany power brokers. The out come was predetermined. Manhattan is the home of the Reform and Independent Democratic organizations and is Boss free. Maybe all party affiliations and support should be eliminated from all elections with publicly financed election taking big money out of the process.

33) Permanent Mayoral control of our schools has a number of problems. It is dependent on who is the Mayor and weakens parent and community influence in there children s education. School districts outside NYC elect school board members. Their focus is education and not running a city. Greater community involvement is the answer to improving the education system.
