I have not previously run for office.

In 2001, I was appointed to Bronx Community Board 8, and from 2004-2008 I had the honor of serving as its Chairman. In that capacity, I worked on virtually every major issue facing the community from zoning to schools to parks to parking. During that time I also served on the Croton Filtration Monitoring Committee, where I advocated for Bronx jobs, better air quality, and financial accountability at the massive water-filtration plant being built in Van Cortlandt Park. I also served on the Task Force to develop the Kingsbridge Armory into a large commercial center. I am

currently the Chairman of the Traffic and Transportation Committee of Community Board No. 8.


In order to better understand the needs of our schools, I served as Principal for a Day at both PS 81 and PS 24 on three separate occasions. As a result of that experience, I created a unique collaboration among more than a dozen local public and private schools known as the Coalition of Riverdale/Kingsbridge Schools (CORKS). Through this organization, local schools have begun to develop close partnerships to enhance their academic, athletic and after-school environments.

My interest in helping young people led me to serve as Board Chairman of two organizations—the Riverdale Nursery School & Family Center, and Adolescent and Family Comprehensive Services in the south Bronx. I also served on the board of Bronx Legal Services, a program that provides free legal services to thousands of Bronxites a year. In order to increase participation in the political process and identify strong candidates for public office, I founded the Northwest Bronx Democratic Alliance (NBDA) in 2001.

I have been honored for my public service by organizations including The Legal Aid Society, inMotion, and MFY Legal Services.

20. Taking into consideration the lessons learned from the debates surrounding congestion pricing and the Ravitch Commission's recommendations to provide the MTA with long-term funding, what would you propose to address the MTA's fiscal solvency issues and ensure that the burden for funding the MTA is equitably distributed among all stakeholders?

The MTA's costs are very frustrating to the City residents. Ridership has never been higher and yet every year there is a deficit. We first need to restore public trust in the budget

allocated to the MTA. After that we will need to evaluate some of the long term capital projects to determine whether to put them on hold. The only way the public will tolerate additional fare increases is if they have faith in MTA's fiscal management and the quality of the services. The State and the City at that point need to ensure that the system receives adequate funds to operate well, including looking at other measures to raise revenue that would only be used for the system – for example, certain bridges should be tolled such as the Brooklyn Bridge – but not the small crossings between the Bronx and Manhattan.

21. What would you propose in terms of creating a greater role for the city council in determining and deciding the city budget?

We need to reduce the total power of the Speaker in the process. There should be a representative group of Council members more closely involved in the budget process who are not solely appointed by the Speaker.

22. What is your position regarding the City's past practice of using surplus tax revenues to pay down future health cost and pension obligations, and the decision not to do so this year?

Its always prudent to pay down debt and obligations and I would hope that in the future when the resources are available we would continue to do so.

23. What is your view of how the taxes paid by New Yorkers compare to the value that is received in City services? Do you believe that taxes should be raised or lowered? To the extent you believe taxes should be changed, please provide specific proposals about what taxes you would raise and what services you would cut, if you didn't raise taxes, listed in order of greatest magnitude.

— I would rate the value of what we get for our taxes as very high. We have strong police protection, public transportation is very good, our parks are in a good shape overall, our schools need improvement but have made strides over the years and we have invested in our infrastructure (although more investment is needed). At this point I do believe that we have to resist continually raising taxes – New York City residents are not doing well financially and we need to hold the line on raising taxes again. I also think that homeowners are now paying high taxes based on outdated assessments. The key is to grow the economy and get people back to work, which will increase revenue. That will have to be a result of local and national recovery and policies to support businesses and spur business and consumer spending. In the meantime, we need to hold spending to current levels and look for more efficient ways of delivering city services.

How would you adjust spending in New York City to accommodate the anticipated reduction in tax revenue as the tax base shifts to lower paying jobs?

Of course more needs to be done to expand the City's economy and make it less reliant on Wall Street. Although Wall Street should and will always be an important part of our City and economy. I believe that the key things to do are to support small businesses through tax incentives and creating areas of the City that will help to incubate businesses. Some of that was done during the technology boom and it did help to attract new businesses. This could help the outer boroughs like the Bronx and Queens, where there are areas conducive to new businesses because of good transportation and real estate availability.

25. What would you propose the Department of Education do to increase the ability for parents and teachers to become more meaningfully involved in the education system? What other positives changes can be made to the New York City public school system?

____ The biggest complaint I have heard from parents is the lack of meaningful input by the community in the new school system. The best way to correct this is to reform the way the Community Education Councils function. They should be made independent of the DOE and supported by Borough Presidents in the same manner as community boards function. They should be given numerous review and advisory functions and a set timeframe for doing so that would ensure that they hold public hearings on issues and provide meaningful input into the process.

26. What would you propose to increase the transparency of the Board of Elections in the City of New York's operations and accountability to the city and its voters?

The more information that can reasonably be put online will improve transparency, and as mentioned above, the hiring should not be done on a political basis.

27. What would you propose to further enhance transparency regarding the relationships between council members, their families, and nonprofits that receive funding from New York City?

All discretionary funding by each Councilperson should be put online so that it can be examined and any relationships at nonprofits must be disclosed in that online listing. In addition, there should be an additional review by the City to determine the appropriateness of the relationship and funding.
