

- 14. When Mayor Michael Bloomberg and the City Council extended the term limits to three consecutive terms I was disgusted and disappointed in our elected officials. The proud voters of New York voted not once, but twice for term limits and their voices should have reigned supreme. Instead, our elected officials violated the trust of the people. Such a gross violation cannot be allowed to occur again, and if the council brings any measure to the floor to overturn the will of the people I will speak out loudly and clearly on the side of the people.
- 18. Clearly, we must address our budget crisis so that we do not enter into a situation where the city must default on their obligations and take drastic cuts across the board. That would be a tragic situation with tremendous repercussions for all New Yorkers. However, we cannot put this burden solely on the backs of our public employees, who are some of the lowest paid, and hardest working members of our workforce. We must look at wasteful spending across the board, including private contractors, among other options to find ways to eliminate waste and bring about a more balanced, and responsible budget. Options like a multi-tiered system should be considered but, only as a last resort.

#### 19. A.

<u>Budetary Process</u> – a Sunlight clause should ensure that every citizen can access and understand the budget process and should clearly lay out where money gets allocated.

<u>Legislative Committee System</u> – should more closely mimic that of the U.S. Congress so that individual members can have more autonomy and more legislation has a chance to reach the floor for a full vote.

Ethics – there should be an independent panel that more closely reviews the campaign finance filings and ethical complaints about members in a way that is fair and open and assures that people of New York Stat that their government is being held accountable.

- B. Yes, New York City has certain issues which are unique to the municipality and they should be allowed to govern independently on them. These include housing, transportation and taxation.
- 20. I would demand that funding should be sought from a wider pool of sources, including people who live outside of New York City yet use our transportation system. We must assure that the revenue and resources are spread fairly and evenly through the City, and not just in Manhattan. Staten Island, especially the South shore is in desperate need of greater public transportation options, and instead we have only been subjected to increasingly higher bridge tolls. This must stop and it will be one of the most important fights I will wage as a councilmember.

- 21. City Council members were elected by their constituents to represent their neighborhoods and therefore have a much greater understanding of what their constituents need, much more so than the Mayor. It is therefore common sense that the City Council should have a greater say in the budget process, and it is inexcusable that they do not already.
- 22. I believe the decision to not use the surplus tax revenue as it has been used in the past was made due to the current financial crisis sweeping the globe. Normally, I would support this practice so long as it continues to contribute to cost savings and the fiscal health of our city.
- Taxes are out of control, and Staten Island is hit even harder by an absurd amount of tolls. While we cannot afford to cut any vital services to our residents, we continue to pay more in taxes and get poorer and poorer quality in government services. Someone needs to line by line and cut government waste, increase accountability and audit our city agencies to find out where our tax dollars are going. I'll be that person.

  We also must bring a greater level of transparency to how our tax dollars are being spent, and make sure that city resources are allocate equally to all parts of the city, through a variety of means including sunlight laws.
- 24. If we have learned anything from the financial crisis is that we cannot rely on Wall Street. I endorse any attempts to diversify our local economy. We have been handed a once in a lifetime opportunity with the federal stimulus money to transform our economy from one reliant solely on Wall Street to one that has numerous sources of revue to guarantee us a safe, viable economic future. I would personally encourage tax credits, subsidies, and rebates to be put into effect so we can draw a variety of businesses that have been in self-imposed exile due to the high costs of operating in the city, namely the movie industry. Small businesses are becoming relics of the past, and that will not happen on my watch. We'll cut the red tape, encourage entrepreneurship put a greater emphasis on solid jobs, like "green jobs," and with all these initiatives we will have a solid tax base.
- 25. I am the proud product of the public school system. Public schools provided me with the opportunities I needed to excel in my academic career and prepared me for the rigorous life of a financial consultant for Fortune 500 companies. My campaign has taken me across the district and I have learned of the trials and tribulations parents and students must endure to go have a successful academic, personal and business career. Most of all I have learned of the plight of special needs children. Their struggle has become my struggle and I intend to carry their voices to City Hall.

As councilwoman I will advocate for greater parental involvement, as well as a push for a more comprehensive well rounded education; including fully funded music and arts programs. We cannot focus solely on tests, we must realize that there is life beyond high school and our children need to be prepared to face the increasingly smaller and more competitive work place.

No one should be denied the opportunity to vote or to run for office because they cannot navigate their way through the Board of Elections bureaucracy.

The process needs to be reviewed, and streamlined so that there is a clear system by which these requests are reviewed and evaluated for conflicts of interest before any money is allocated.
