Question 5 Without seeing explicit language on a proposal to allow
parolees the automatic ability to vote I have to withold my support.
I could accept a plan which allowed the renewal of the right to vote
if the plan excluded certain violent sex felonies, crimes against children, crimes against the public trust, and election fraud. Parole
is a conditional release and as you know parolees are restricted
from various behaviors and other rights enjoyed by the public. To
give parolees blanket amnesty without considering the crime would
not be good government.
Question 7 While I support the idea of no-excuse absentee ballot
voting, I would only approve the measure if there were safeguards
against fraud. There were irregularities in the recent special election
for the 27th S.D., in which absentee ballot fraud was alleged. It
is my fear that if we abolish affadavit sections we will open ourselves
up the potential for campaigns embarking on massive fraud, by being
able to enter a voter's home and coerce them to fill out an absentee
ballot for their candidate.

- 1. Fight the construction of a marine waste transfer station in the district.

 I have rallied the community to fight this environmental injustice and filed an Article 78 lawsuit against the DEC.
- 2. Restore transit cuts. The loss of two bus lines has hurt our seniors and the disabled. I launched a campaign to restore the cuts.
- 3. Education funding. I promised to include CFE monies for underserved schools. Partial restorations were made in the 2012-13 budget.
- 4. <u>Higher Education. Vote for policies that made college affordable. I</u>
 voted against SUNY 2020 because of the tuition hikes sans increased funds
- 5. Rent reform. Promised to raise the decontrol threshold. We did this as part of the tax cap package.

- 1. Marine waste station. The fight against this continues
- 2. Transit restorations. This campaign is on-going.
- 3. Education funding. Directing more funding to underserved schools
