HAILE RIVERA

Democratic Candidate for 86th Assembly District (Bronx)

I would like to take this opportunity to expand on my position on some of the issues presented in this questionnaire. As a candidate in a special primary election for State Assembly, question #10 is of particular interest. Had Governor Cuomo made the decision to allow a special election to take place, independent of the natural electoral cycle, I would not be sitting here today. A County Boss would have appointed the Democratic candidate, and in doing so anointed the next Assemblymember. I agree with the intent of bill A5290/S161 but disagree with its structure of requiring an election to take place 45 days later. Candidates need extensive amounts of time to prepare an effective campaign and the public deserves to be able to investigate and scrutinize the credibility of the person who wishes to represent them. For that reason I would propose a bill that will have a fixed "Special Election" date. For example, a vacancy in a State office requiring a special election would fall on this pre-selected date. For instance, if there is less than 90 days between the date of the vacancy and the Special Election day then the election will be held alongside the regular statewide election calendar. If less than 90 days prior to the November election then it would take place on this designated day. This would remove the ability of a County Boss to make a selection that undermines the power of the people and allows for predictability in the democratic process.

Question #3: As for question #3, I oppose it on the grounds that the petitioning process already has a low threshold for signature and witnessing requirements. Despite this low threshold there are previous and current examples of fraud and other tactics used to meet the requirements set forth by State law. Lessening the requirements, in my opinion, will make it extremely easy to become a candidate and will require insufficient input from the people. There should be a balance between allowing for ample participation of candidates and assuring that those who achieve being on the ballot are well vetted. I believe our current system achieves that balance.

Question #31: I agree on distributing funds evenly for all members so as remove favoritism and possible corruption that may arise from the current system. In NYC members get funds as the discretion of the Speaker and there have been presumed issues that the Speaker has punished some members through reducing their share. At the end of the day it is the people of a particular district that suffer and that is not a fair system.

Question #33: I oppose a later start to the State fiscal year as noted in question #33. My reasons for doing so are twofold. First, adjusting the State fiscal year without making concurrent changes in other City or County fiscal year start dates will have a detrimental affect on the ability of these municipal governments to provide accurate budgets that depend on State funds. Secondly, the Legislative Session, beginning in January and ending in June, is already largely occupied with the budgetary process. Extending the time to have budgetary proceedings and negotiations, while it may have positive benefits, will take up an even larger portion of the Session and not allow ample time to carry out the other business of the State legislature.

Top Five 2013 Campaign Promises or Goals

- 1) Introduce Special Election Reform- as mentioned previously.
- 2) Introduce and pass Per Diem Reform
 - a. Currently members of the legislature are reimbursed for expenses related to lodging, travel and food while conducting business. In November of 2012, the State Controller found that Assemblyman William Boyland spent \$153,089 between January 2007 and January 2011. That is an average of \$38,274/year. Insufficient documentation was provided and he was mandated to repay \$67,497 of those receipts. In another report by a news outlet in 2012 it was found that Assemblyman Eric Stevenson spent \$31,350 and William Scarborough spent another \$30,000 of taxpayer dollars to cover these expenses. A cap should be instituted to curb abuses and protect the people's money.
- 3) Introduce/Suppport Legislation for Early Voting in NYS: The fact is that Early Voting increases voter turnout, especially among African-Americans and Latinos who are consistently disenfranchised.
- 4) Work with my colleagues in the Legislature to increase funding for CUNY and ensure it remains affordable. Increasingly students at our community and senior colleges are being asked to fit a larger portion of the bill for public education. This at the same time that administrative officials are getting hefty salaries and raises. Both the level of tuition must be adjusted to remain affordable and there must be transparency and integrity in its use.
- 5) Work with HUD to revise their use of the area median income for the development of real estate and as an indicator for rents. Very few people in the Bronx make the AMI of \$81,300 as dictated by HUD. Yet, this figure is used when determining rents and eventually exasperates gentrification and the expelling of mass amounts of people out of their own neighborhoods.
