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Dear Fellow New York Voter,

Two years ago, many New Yorkers were rightfully concerned about the dysfunction of our state government in Albany. There was significant public clamor to reform the legislature and improve the way in which our state government was functioning. Feeling the heat of the public's concern, incumbent legislators joined with their challengers in embracing a number of reforms that just a few years ago no one wanted to seriously discuss; campaign finance, legislative rules, gerrymandering, lobbying, ethics, and public authorities.

Though the overwhelming majority of state legislators won reelection in 2004, many still moved quickly to wear the mantle of reform. 2005 in Albany proved to be a far more productive reform year than 2006. Progress was made as legislative rules were strengthened. Lobbying activity reporting was expanded and enforcement stepped up. Public authorities gained greater oversight. These achievements were all good, but much more was left on the table to do.

In evaluating candidates again this year, Citizens Union is holding incumbent legislators accountable to the promises they made in 2004 in the area of reform. It is one of the reasons we preferred fewer incumbents this primary season than in 2004.

Reform of state government remains an important issue and has been the focus of much of the cases being made by individual statewide candidates as to why they should be elected. Given the importance of these reform issues along with the impact state government has upon the City of New York, Citizens Union decided to evaluate and support candidates for Governor, Attorney General, and Comptroller for the first time in its 109 year history. We hope that the promises made during this campaign become the reality of next year in Albany.

The 2006 election not only presents itself as an historic opportunity for reform, but also marks the first time since 1954 when the offices of Governor and Attorney General were both open seats in which no incumbent was running for either office. [In that November, New Yorkers elected Averell Harriman as Governor and Jacob Javits as Attorney General.]

Citizens Union has again been fortunate to benefit from the good work of the members of the all-volunteer Local Candidates Committee, who contributed many hours during this summer to interview candidates and gather in meetings to share information and evaluate the candidates. We have considered many sources of information in making our preference decisions, but none more important than candidates' positions and actions on issues of reform.

This directory lists every contest for public office that will be on the ballot in New York City on September 12, 2006. Voters should be aware that New York's tangled election laws often result in the last minute elimination (or reinstatement) of candidates.

Many key contests for State Assembly and State Senate seats have been evaluated by nonpartisan interview teams from Citizens Union's Local Candidates Committee. However, we do not evaluate every race for public office. This year, for the first time ever, Citizens Union has taken the historic step of evaluating candidates for statewide office. Citizens Union does not evaluate candidates for federal office or candidates for the judiciary.

This year's interview teams were charged with soliciting candidates' views on key proposals aimed at reforming the legislative process in Albany, assessing the candidates' general experience, and their knowledge of district, city, and statewide issues. No single answer by a candidate ensures – or rules out – a preference.

Recommendations for a "Preferred" rating are made by the Local Candidates Committee on the basis of the interview, research, an issues questionnaire, and first-hand knowledge of the candidate. These recommendations are reviewed by the Citizens Union Board, which makes the final decision. The "Preferred" rating reflects a candidate that Citizens Union deems not only qualified for the office being sought, but committed to an agenda of positive reform in Albany. Candidates not preferred may nevertheless be highly regarded by Citizens Union. These distinctions are generally reflected in the commentaries. The "Preferred" rating will apply for the Primary Election only. Citizens Union will be issuing "Endorsed" ratings for the General Election contests.

A "No Preference" rating may result when there is insufficient information available, when one or more of the candidates has not been interviewed, or when a determination has been made that the candidates are of equal merit. Only candidates that have been interviewed can receive our preference.
