TOP FIVE 2018 CAMPAIGN PROMISES OR GOALS

1. _Reducing school overcrowding: Our schools in New York City are some of the most overcrowded in the entire nation, and here in Corona, Elmhurst and Jackson Heights we have some of the worst in the city. We cannot cram our children into these learning environments where they don't get the attention they deserve and require and where teachers have too many students to keep track of. I would support an increased funding of our public-school system to hire more highquality educators and build extensions to our schools, so that we can replace trailers with classrooms.

2. Standing up for tenants and co-op owners: Here in New York City our rents keep on rising but hard working New Yorkers wages seem to be stagnant. I believe that by promoting MCI reform and property tax relief we can help tenants and co-op owners afford living in this city. The hard-working new Yorkers are what make this city run so smoothly and it's why we're the greatest city in the world. But, if people must be pushed out due to rents the city will suffer, we need to come up with realistic solutions to these issues and MCI reform and property tax relief is a perfect place to start.

3. Long-term MTA Solution: Our subway system is crumbling right before our eyes, we see it everyday a simple commute to work from Corona takes 2 hours due to signal malfunctions on multiple lines bringing the whole system to a standstill. Workers see wages taken from them and no one at the MTA is held accountable. I believe the only way to fix our transit system is by approving a robust MTA spending package that will focus on improving the signal system which seems to keep on breaking down. I believe installing congestion pricing on cars driving in certain areas in downtown Manhattan will help pay for this very much needed improvement while also help reducing congestion in the city.

4. Protecting Immigrant Rights: It's no secret that right now in America immigrant rights are under siege. We have a president who has described immigrants as animals, who separates immigrant families, and keeps hard working New Yorkers in fear of deportation and raids from ICE agents. As the daughter of immigrants, I cannot watch my community which is comprised of mainly first or second-generation immigrants be attacked by this administration. I will fight to keep New York City's status as a sanctuary city where law-abiding undocumented immigrants don't need to live in fear.

5. Protecting workers: My community is comprised of many hard working class families. A lot of these families and individuals work hard jobs, and many of them work in conditions and environments that can at times be dangerous but in a lot of cases and scenarios the employers aren't held accountable for these actions. I want to help change that by enacting protections for workers in the workplace, and creating penalties for those employers who skert these worker protections. I also believe that the state legislature should work on and pass better worker wage protections so that workers also can come home with a wage that they can live on.

Citizens Union believes that all New Yorkers deserve to be represented by officials who work for the public interest and honor the public trust. With the corruption conviction of recent legislative leaders, we seek to endorse a candidate who will demonstrate that she/he will honor the full commitment of the oath of office, and always represent the public interest above all else.

I am born and raised in this district, I've lived here my whole life and I've always wanted to improve my community in any way that I could.
