#2 are preferential to maintaining the status quo in Question #3, it would be inadvisable to	settle for half-
hearted reform proposals. Partisan gerrymandering is a key to understanding some of the g	gridlock in the
legislature today and the processes which enable those methods of redistricting must be	
eliminated.	
I support the principle outlined in Question #6 because ballot access is an important	t part of any
democratic system. However, some current petitioning requirements, specifically the 500 s	<u>ignatures needed</u>
for a 130,000 person Assembly District, are not onerous. The signature requirement serves	s as an indicator to
measure commitment to the race and connection to the community.	
In reference to Questions #9 and 10, I am the author of A. 4799 and A. 811, bills the	at would allow
online voter registration through the Board of Elections website and require that voter regi	stration forms be
made available to students, respectively.	
Additionally, I am the author of A. 3853, legislation which would mandate a standing	<u>Conference</u>
Committee to reconcile differences between similar but not identical bills. This could prod	uce greater
cooperation between the two chambers and become an asset in the budget process, in refer	ence to Question
#31.

TOP FIVE CAMPAIGN PROMISES OR GOALS FROM 2008 AND ACTION ON THEM

- Public Safety: I authored A. 7014, signed into law in 2008, which provides greater oversight of officials
 tasked with inspecting cranes, in order to help prevent the deadly crane accidents that occurred in the 73rd
 District in the past few years.
- Ground Zero health concerns: I have authored two laws to extend workers compensation benefits to
 9/11 rescue, recovery and clean-up responders whose claims have been or would be barred on statute of limitations grounds.
- 3. Protecting a woman's right to choose: I cosponsored A. 11484, the Reproductive Health Act, which would modernize our laws and codify a woman's right to choose in New York.
- 4. Education: I authored a law signed by the Governor in 2009 which allows the renovations for PS 59 to be completed on time, creating additional seats in the overcrowded school system. I have also opposed the potentially disastrous cuts proposed by the Governor to our public education system, from primary and secondary education to the CUNY and SUNY systems.
- 5. Affordable Housing: Two bills which I authored to help protect and expand affordable housing were recently passed by the Assembly and Senate. The first, A 9757, would help ensure that disabled tenants are given the same protection by New York state laws that they are under federal law. Another bill which passed each chamber is A 10689, which would prevent landlords from discriminating on the basis of income. A third bill which I authored that passed the Assembly is A. 860, which would raise the thresholds for high-income decontrol. I have also cosponsored A. 1688, legislation which passed the

Assembly and would give New York City authority of its rent regulation laws, in order to better serve tenants.

TOP FIVE 2010 CAMPAIGN PROMISES OR GOALS

- 1. Work towards passage of reapportionment reform that would go into effect prior to the 2012 election.
- 2. Restore funding to cuts made in the 2010 Budget to vital services, chiefly public education and healthcare.
- 3. Continue advocating for affordable housing and protect those currently occupying affordable housing.
- 4. <u>As Chairman of the Committee on Libraries and Education Technology, advocate for the necessary component that libraries and similar institutions play in communities across New York.</u>
- 5. <u>Improve the public transit system by providing funds for adequate bus and subway service.</u>
