VOTING AND ELECTIONS REFORM

1. What is your position with respect to allowing voters who are registered as independents to vote in party primaries?

I would allow any registered voter to sign a petition to have a person have the right to run for public office, and sign for as many people as they want

2. What is your position on passage of state legislation that would allow referenda initiated by the City Council and/or the public to appear on the ballot at the same time as a referendum initiated by a charter commission appointed by the Mayor?

I would allow any referendum that has past the test to get on the ballot allowed, let the voters up or down the issue

3. What is your position on increasing the pay of Election Day poll workers above the current \$200 they are allotted per election event?

At this time the amount paid to poll workers is in my option fine, if I really thought that y a better grade of poll worker by paying more I would support that, but I do not believe that would happen

4. What is your position on restructuring New York's current board of elections model to eliminate political party responsibility for overall election administration and replace it with a system that narrows political party involvement to certification of candidate petitions and the actual counting of votes?

This is a tough one, coming from a area that has nonpartisan municipal elections, there still is the party influence in that style of elections, in a perfect world I would like it to be as non bias possible, but that world does not exists0 128

5. What is your position on having an election administration system where there is a local elections executive director appointed by the mayor upon recommendation by a new board that is chosen by the mayor and the city council?

That would be fine, if there were total transparence and check and balances to make sure its non partisan

The people that gave funds to a particular campaign, should not have there donations put into another campaign with out there consent, the campaign committee has no right to just transfer funds

I believe that there would have to a very strong test to have ballot proposals get public monies

Yes the committee chairs should have the power to conduct all of the business of the committees, with input from the entire council and the speakers office

b. Should committee hearings and votes be scheduled at the direction of the chairs?

Like in and structure governmental or business, there has to be someone that manages the day to day business, and the chair should be that person

c. Should committees be able to issue subpoenas by a vote of their members?

The issuing of subpoenas would be a helpful tool in hearings, especially if there is an investigation of a city agency or the mayors office ect, but the state legislature I believe would have to give the council some power and penalty's such as contempt of council to make it work

- 10. What is your position on requiring that any future increase in councilmember compensation not affect those serving in the current term of the council and only be applied prospectively to the following term?

I think the pay for city council members is a little low for this large a city, you only get what you pay for, and in the whole of the city budget there salary's is a very little cut of the pie, people should get paid for what they do, those candidates that would only take some of there salary as a campaign issues are just not going to do the joba , the people of your origination are paid for what you do and city council people should be too

11. What is your position on consolidating the current City Council committee structure and reducing the number of overall committees?

The more you have input into the workings of government works better that just a few having all the power to choose what is important to the council, there should be as many committees as needed to look at every matter of the people

12. What is your position on term limits for elected officials?

I am not in favor of term limits, I believe in this day and age, the public as the tools and access to information to decide to vote out an incumbent, I am in favor of having no elected office being less that four years, to have elected official such as congress, assembly and state senators elected to only two year terms, has them continually running for office instead of doing there real job governing

I am in favor of the voters deciding almost everything

14. What is your position on the recent extension of term limits for the city's elected officials to three consecutive four-year terms? Please explain your answer.

This is a very tough issue, the Mayor, myself been a student of politics in my life, pulled off a very legal (maybe not that above board, but legal) maneuver. He let the powers that be look the other way (thinking he was running for the presidency)consider he would try for a third term.

The two referendums, for term limits were almost as brilliant with Ralph Lauder and the republican party out maneuvered the Dem's twice, if you look at the results of the two votes

for term limits as you know you will find that except for a couple of districts in the city the issues was voted down, just in those districts that Lauder and his group spent millions of dollars knowing that they would get the Republican base out to the polls in mass, which they did to pass the referendum

The commissioner has to have the fiale word, but he should have a legislative guidelines how to rule, with the CCRB recombination being his guide, with appeal to the decision if not in the lines of the board being allowed

16. What is your position on changing the current land use process under ULURP to increase the role of community-based planning?

The community Board system, should be given more power, other than just recommending to land use in there area, with the use of real public hearing and a appeal process

17. What is your position regarding the creation of a Charter Revision Commission to review specifically the roles of the various offices of government and how well government has functioned since the 1988 and 1989 charter review commissions?

Review of the city charter should happen every ten year, just of course as the census does, the world is changing to fast not to examine the workings of the city

18. What is your position on reforming the current pension funding structure to create multiple tiers for future city government employees?

I am not up to speed with the pension system at this time, of course if elected I will to the best of my and my staffs ability to be abreast of all the city's needs and issues

a. In FY 2008-09, New York City spent \$12 billion on pensions and fringe benefits for City employees out of a total budget of \$62 billion. What would you do to address the growing pension costs borne by the city and New York City tax payers? Since this not my expertise, I would find the best and brightest people in this city to examine and recommend to the council what should be the best way of the city in curbing pension costs.

I can not know everything, and believe that is always good to get the opinion of the experts in any field before I take any action on a issue

19. What is your position with respect to the City Council passing a resolution calling upon the State Legislature to establish a State Constitutional Convention?

I believe its time for a look at the state constitution especially with respect to the city

 - 1. The formula of tax money from the city coming back to the city
 - 2. The control and schools being controlled by the city with less control of the state legislature
 - 3. the reform of the election system, especially when it comes to the petitioning system
- b. Do you believe that greater home rule should be granted to the City of New York? If so, in what areas should further sovereignty be given?

The need what and desires of the City compared to most of the rest of the state are in many cases very different, if the city is going to give the state such a large percentage of the tax dollars, we should get a bigger say in how it is spent, not that the upstate legislators are not looking out for the interest of the whole state they sometimes do not or will not look at our needs

20. Taking into consideration the lessons learned from the debates surrounding congestion pricing and the Ravitch Commission's recommendations to provide the MTA with long-term funding, what would you propose to address the MTA's fiscal solvency issues and ensure that the burden for funding the MTA is equitably distributed among all stakeholders?

The commuter tax should be put back in place (this is one of the upstate officials only seeing there needs), if you do not live in the city but want to make your fortune here, you have to pay for that privilege

21. What would you propose in terms of creating a greater role for the city council in determining and deciding the city budget?

This is the councils on real role, but it should not be just a hearing and up or down vote system, the council has to be allowed to dictate, may be with line item veto power on the city budget

22. What is your position regarding the City's past practice of using surplus tax revenues to pay down future health cost and pension obligations, and the decision not to do so this year?

At this time I am not in the position to make a comment on this issue

23. What is your view of how the taxes paid by New Yorkers compare to the value that is received in City services? Do you believe that taxes should be raised or lowered? To the extent you believe taxes should be changed, please provide specific proposals about what taxes you would raise and what services you would cut, if you didn't raise taxes, listed in order of greatest magnitude.

I am sorry I would have to talk to you for hours on this question, there are so many ways to cut costs with out raising tax's. this city has become a very anti small business city, they use tax's fines and fee's to beef up the city bank accounts but make it almost imposable to make a go of it as a small retail business owner, vacant retail space in my district just below Canal street is more than most small city's it this country, as of March 2009 there were 386 vacant store fronts as of June 2009 in china town there were 82, the tax dollars alone lost by the lake of people working in those retail establishment is in the is staggering, the perks of city employees in the management level, such as city cars that are just used to go to and from the employs home. Because the city is self insured, we pay out millions of dollars in liability cases that would never would of happened if insurance companies were involved with whether or not thinks like bike paths stair cases and thousands of other dangerous situations were allowed by city agencies

As I stated this is a subject that would take hours of discussion just to get threw the facts the ramifications and the solutions

24. Many policy advocates champion the creation of a more diversified economy, and one that is less reliant on Wall Street. What is your position on such a plan? If you support it, what would you do to diversify the city's economy? How would you adjust spending in New York City to accommodate the anticipated reduction in tax revenue as the tax base shifts to lower paying jobs?

My district being part of the financial area of the city and now that it has become a 24 7 area, with over 48 thousand new residents since 9/11 I am a little parcel on the change in relying on the wall street industries, we are the financial capital of the world and are not going anywhere fast, so we will have to live with it and hope to add to the outer boros a new industrial base

25. What would you propose the Department of Education do to increase the ability for parents and teachers to become more meaningfully involved in the education system? What other positives changes can be made to the New York City public school system?

Teach and also on a smaller level ave a much larger say in the workings of the city school system
