I need to research this question further to develop a more informed response. I will say that I am concerned about making only prospective changes for future workers that creates a system where existing employees are treated dramatically differently than new employees. There is a fundamental intergenerational fairness issue that needs to be considered.
. In FY 2008-09, New York City spent \$12 billion on pensions and fringe benefits for City employees out of a total budget of \$62 billion. What would you do to address the growing pension costs borne by the city and New York City tax payers?
I would base pensions off of base salaries and restrict the ability to "juice" pensions in the final year or by including overtime in the calculations.
. What is your position with respect to the City Council passing a resolution calling upon the State Legislature to establish a State Constitutional Convention? Support
a. If support, what are the three most important areas that need improvement?
First is apportionment of the prisoners when establishing districts. The current process of counting prisoners, who are not allowed to vote, towards apportioning representation in the legislature creates perverse distortions (and perverse incentives) in our representative bodies. Second, I would revisit the powers allocated to municipalities, particularly cities of a certain size that could use some aditional discretion in their own

. Taking into consideration the lessons learned from the debates surrounding congestion pricing and the Ravitch Commission's recommendations to provide the MTA with long-term funding, what would you propose to address the MTA's fiscal solvency issues and ensure that the burden for funding the MTA is equitably distributed among all stakeholders?
First and foremost, we need a more progressive taxing scheme at the state level that supports improving our transit infrastructure. However, based on the experience of the Pataki years onward, we cannot rely on our state government to be a reliable and responsible supporter of transit. I would implement the following specific, dedicated funding mechanisms (in addition to the restored commuter tax): toll the free East and Harlem River crossings, price our "free" street resources by implementing residential parking permits, and work with our Federal partners to increase gasoline taxes at the Federal level. Unfortunately, increasing our state gas tax is relatively ineffectual given our close proximity to low-tax states like New Jersey. Another avenue to pursue would be a compact with Connecticut and New Jersey to address gas taxes and regional transit planning on a regionwide basis.
. What would you propose in terms of creating a greater role for the city council in determining and deciding the city budget?

Yes, as noted above. Particularly in our control of our streets - I would give the city the

The Council should have a more input into allocations in the City budget. We could move to a system that is more akin to the process of the US House to allow for more Council input.

. What is your position regarding the City's past practice of using surplus tax revenues to pay down future health cost and pension obligations, and the decision not to do so this year?

If you are referring to the Mayor's discretionary \$2 Billion tax rebate from last year, I was a vocal opponent of that decision. I actually would have allocated those funds largely to transit investment given the massive hole that the MTA's capital plan is facing.

. What is your view of how the taxes paid by New Yorkers compare to the value that is received in City services? Do you believe that taxes should be raised or lowered? To the extent you believe taxes should be changed, please provide specific proposals about what taxes you would raise and what services you would cut, if you didn't raise taxes, listed in order of greatest magnitude.

I would increase the progressivity of the City's income tax schedule and avoid increasing regressive taxes such as sales taxes. In general, I believe New Yorkers receive good value for taxes paid. I would increase marginal income tax rates before cutting city services.

. Many policy advocates champion the creation of a more diversified economy, and one that is less reliant on Wall Street. What is your position on such a plan? If you support it, what would you do to diversify the city's economy? How would you adjust spending in New York City to accommodate the anticipated reduction in tax revenue as the tax base shifts to lower paying jobs?

I believe it is a mistake to rely too heavily on the FIRE economy. One thing that we can do to broaden the jobs base is to preserve space that is zoned for manufacturing and industrial uses. Pressure to convert these properties for luxury residential uses have caused viable employers to be driven out of our city at a time we need them more than ever. Second, I would invest in incentives to new technology businesses focused on green energy (solar, wind, geothermal) to drive the next generation of growth industries in our city. Lastly, I would focus on the infrastructure of New York (transit, freight, sewers, electrical grid, communications, education) to keep New York the most desirable place to live and work, which will itself attract new employers looking for a high quality talent pool.

. What would you propose the Department of Education do to increase the ability for parents and teachers to become more meaningfully involved in the education system? What other positives changes can be made to the New York City public school system?

We need to preserve a voice for parents and educators in our school governance structure. I would bolster the role of CECs to take an active role in the system. I would also work for more independence of the School Board from the Mayor by appointing a majority of the Board by other parties, such as the Borough Presidents, public Advocate, Comptroller and City Council President. I would also change the role of Superintendents to spend more of their time focused on the issues affecting their own principals and district areas.

. What would you propose to increase the transparency of the Board of Elections in the City of New York's operations and accountability to the city and its voters?

Sunlight is the most powerful disinfectant. We need to overhaul the reporting of the BOE by making filings more accessible online. In addition, we need to reform the electoral process to make the process of running for office more user-friendly and accessible. Forms should be created to allow online filing. Downloadable forms for petitions and petition cover sheets should be made available. And the Board should provide a more helpful role to those seeking office.

. What would you propose to further enhance transparency regarding the relationships between council members, their families, and nonprofits that receive funding from New York City?

As recent disclosures (and criminal prosecutions) have made evident, we need more transparency in where our money goes and who is employed by organizations receiving City money. Any organization that employs family members of a Council member should be subject to strict oversight and heightened audit requirements.

We are paid to serve the public, not to enrich our selves and our families from the Treasury. I feel very strongly that no councilmember should be allowed to dispense monies to an organization that employs or otherwise remunerates a family member or entity controlled by a family member of that council member.
