Additional Comments:

- 1-I fear that this may open the door for wealthy candidates to have a greater influence over elections, particularly in down ballot races, where the press aren't pay quite as much attention.
- 4- In addition to registering New Yorkers to vote, agencies should also be encouraging active participation in voting. This is particularly true of agencies who serve New Yorkers who are more low-income and likely to be disengaged from the electoral process.
- 6- I strongly support this. The public has lost faith in the Board of Elections ability to administer elections fairly and efficiently. I've seen far too many lines stretching around the block on Election Day of people waiting to vote.
- 12- Power at the Council needs to be decentralized. Members should be equals. Right now the Speaker has too much influence. Much of this influence comes from the Speaker's ability to hire central staff.
- 13 D- I would explore taking some committees back down to the subcommittee level, if they are not doing relevant, meaningful work. Some committees are redundant.
- 16- It is inappropriate and self serving for members to authorize their own pay increases.
- 17- Member items fund programs and organizations that do crucial work in our communities. They should be distributed based on need. They are too important to be used to reward political loyalty, or punish members who clash with the Speaker.

- 18- I am open to any ideas that increase transparency and restore the public's faith in government.
- 21- I am afraid this would open the door for investigation based only on rumor.
- 22- The CCRB should refer cases to existing offices, such as the District Attorney, that already possess the authority to prosecute.
- 24- As a former Community Board Chair I'm a strong believer that these offices provide vital services to all New Yorkers and opportunities for public dialogue. Their budget shouldn't be subject to politics.
- 27, 28- I support this so long as the discretion of the Borough Presidents and Community Board Chairs are maintained.

TOP FIVE CAMPAIGN PROMISES FROM YOUR MOST RECENT CAMPAIGN AND ACTION ON THEM

- 1. Improving educational resources in District 38: Since elected, I have fought to bring nearly \$500 Million in educational resources to my District. This term, I continued to fight for better schools. I recently attended the first graduation of Sunset Park High School something I worked towards over decades of advocacy. I successfully fought against co-locations of Charter Schools in Sunset Park and Red Hook Public Schools. I fought for increased capital funds to renovate gymnasiums, refurbish libraries and restrooms, build dance studios and more. I have worked to ensure our schools have greater access to cultural programming. Recently, I successfully fought to save a local Sunset Park Public School from closure.
- Fight for affordable housing: Since last elected, I worked to ensure inclusionary
 housing was included in future rezonings in my District and ensured that happened. I
 also was the primary sponsor of Local Law 16-2012, which extended rent
 stabilization in New York City, benefiting millions of renters, including many in my
 communities.
- 3. Advocate for more services for our immigrant communities: Each year since last elected, I have advocated for and successfully secured funds for Adult Literacy services in all five boroughs. My Adult Literacy Initiative has provided millions of dollars to non-profit groups offering free ESL, GED, and Adult Basic Education

courses. I have been a proud co-sponsor of countless pro-immigrant bills in the Council.

- 4. Reforming Juvenile Justice in NYC: In this past term alone as Chair of the Juvenile Justice Committee, I have sponsored and passed legislation to: merge the Department of Juvenile Justice with ACS, increase transparency and oversight for secure City detention centers, and raise the age of criminal responsibility for non-violent offenders to 18. My Committee has also been instrumental in enacting the Close to Home Initiative, allowing for more of our young people to receive holistic community-based alternatives to incarceration.
- 5. **Supporting our seniors**: This past term, I was fortunate enough to be able to directly save two senior centers in my District from closure: United Senior Center of Sunset Park and the Red Hook Senior Center. As Budget Negotiator for Brooklyn, I have worked to combat the Administration's cuts for senior services throughout the City.

- To advocate for City, State and Federal resources to rebuild Sandy ravaged parts of Red Hook.
- 2. Continue to advocate for affordable housing, and the preservation of public housing.
- 3. Continue to expand educational opportunities for our children.
- Continue to invest in parks and open spaces to improve quality of life in our community.
- 5. Continue to improve outcomes for young people, across the city, who come into contact with the justice system.
