Citizen’s Union describes itself as a good government group dedicated to making democracy work for all New Yorkers. What is critical about the characterization of the organization’s mission is that it is not meant to serve as an aristocratic think tank, Citizen’s Union has rather long held a reputation for practical progressive accomplishments in acting as a leading advocate for necessary action and reform. I believe what defines both myself and my candidacy is not my articulation of platitudes that I know you would find agreeable, but rather my unique and proven ability to move our mutual agenda forward.

The district I seek to represent has unfortunately been handicapped in Albany of late due to the ethical failings of those elected to serve us. While thankfully our representation will soon change, the basic issues concerning the East side of Manhattan have accordingly not been moved forward. However, many of the key local issues are not ones within whose parameters there is much room for dispute between the spectrum of candidates.

We all believe that our local environment will be significantly inhibited by an establishment of the proposed East Side Marine Transfer Station, we are all looking to ensure greater controls on the air quality during the construction of the 2nd Avenue Subway line, and we all understand that we need to improve public transportation for residents of Roosevelt Island. Unfortunately much of the campaign has focused on each candidate taking what they believe are a more solid position of the above issues, my campaign rather recognizes and appreciates our cohesiveness on the issues above, and would rather concern itself more on demonstrating my record and proven ability to ensure that our community realizes tangible results.

I am not a banker, I have not changed party affiliations for convenience, nor will I politically align myself with the who have ethically failed our community simply for short term personal political gain. What I am is a current resident of the district, a self-made successful professional, who decided to postpone personal gain to fight for the ideals that we jointly believe in. For 28 years I volunteered to serve in the United States Army, not as a child who wanted a gun and a power trip, but as someone who thought he could play a role helping others in their quest for democracy.

My service in the armed forces centered around my position as Deputy Commander of the Kirkuk Provincial Reconstruction Team requiring me to design and implement the economic development, infrastructure, education, and public health care program serving over 2.5 million people. I didn’t go overseas to fight, I went to lead the rebuilding efforts for an untold amount of innocent civilians. I was awarded three bronze stars for my efforts in community building activities, ensuring that people worked together who were certainly not pre-disposed to do so. I accomplished this by rolling up my sleeves, listening to those whose lives I affected, and earning their respect the old-fashioned way.

I learned how to play nicely in the literal sandbox that is Iraq, and in order to see real results that will help our community we need an assembly member who understands how to play nicely in the figurative sandbox that is Albany.

We need an Assembly member who doesn't just say that he is supportive of election reform, campaign finance transparency, and a restoration of the moral and ethical high ground upon which elected officials are supposed to stand, we need a representative who can be all of those things while building the necessary coalitions and relationships required to be effective in a legislature as diverse as ours. We need the high ground without the high mindedness, we need the gravitas without the arrogance, we need a progressive representative who can respect the institution and be practically effective within its rightful confines.

I'm running for Assembly to stop the talk. I'm running for Assembly to make sure that we finally have a representative who can bring both respect and results back to our community, I'm running for Assembly because I'm the one who can get things done.
