TOP FIVE 2014 CAMPAIGN PROMISES OR GOALS

1. Bring Democratic Leadership to the Senate – Before substantive changes can be made in this state, we need to break down the existing barriers to reform put in place by the Senate status quo. My experience and ability to get results as Comptroller and Councilmember will allow me to be a strong Democratic leader upon entering office, where I'll work hard to close the wealth gap that's the result of years of the Senate ignoring the middle class, working families of New York.
2. Creating Quality, Safe, and Equitable Public Education – I'm a product of New York City public schools and I currently have a son enrolled in NYC public schools. The Senate is getting in the way of quality education for all students by shifting funds from traditional public schools to charter schools and by rigorously defending a test-driven system that cheats our kids out of meaningful, project-based learning. I'll do whatever I can to change this in Albany. This includes expanding the existing pre-K program, emphasizing after school programs, securing free lunch for all NYC public school students, and seeking innovative solutions to decreasing CUNY and SUNY tuitions.
3. Creating and Protecting Good Jobs – As Councilmember, I consistently advocated for higher wages and crucial benefits like paid sick leave. And as Comptroller, I continued that work by enforcing prevailing wage laws and seeking procurement reforms that would ensure the creation of union jobs. As a Senator, I'll expand on this work by seeking further procurement reforms, as well as protecting worker safety by ensuring that threats to crucial laws, such as the Triborough Amendment and Scaffolding Law, remain unchanged.
4. Create and Preserve Affordable Housing – Every New Yorker has the right to housing that they can afford. To keep this right from being impinged upon by steeply rising housing costs, we must build and preserve affordable housing. My approach to legislating the creation and preservation of affordable housing is holistic and involves fighting for quality jobs that make it easier for New Yorkers to afford housing, making developers who seek subsidies build and preserve substantial amounts of affordable units, protecting rent stabilization laws, and going after landlords who seek to cheat tenants out of affordable, safe housing.
5. Make Fair Elections a Reality – There is no logical reason why State Legislative and Statewide elected offices should not adhere to a public campaign finance system similar to New York City. The only reason is partisan politics and its perpetrators are the current Senate leadership. One of my top priorities upon entering the Senate will be to fight for fair elections. Every New Yorker deserves a strong voice in the electoral process, not just wealthy donors and big corporations.
