3. I would have candidates pay a fee of 2% of salary of the offices sought. Those that run for party offices would pay only a small fee based on the offices.

5. They should complete their parole first. The Board of Elections is a mess and could not handle a parolee’s voter registrations status timely. Parolees can be pull off the street for any simple violation of their parole and thus not be able to cast a vote legally.

13. I have been dealing with the CFB for years and have encountered many problems with this system. The regulations get more complicated every year and that makes it almost impossible for non-accountants not to get penalized. Plus the agency has grown too large and takes too long to complete their reviews. Plus as we saw last year in the Mayor’s race they became the arbitrator not the voters. They denied John Liu his matching funds and place artificial restrictions on who should be in the CFB sponsor debates. We cannot have a government agency making our choices for us!

16. This is not a good idea because corporate money would just flow to PAC’s. We need to know who is giving candidates money.

24. We must also add a review process. Every 5 to 7 years, and earlier if the judge has numerous complainants! This panel would have the power to remove the judge or send him/her back for more training. Bad judges need to be removed from the bench before they do too much harm.

27. Pension forfeiture should only occur when the felony was from abuse of their public job.
